At the last meeting......

May's meeting was full of practical ideas and tips. To get the ball rolling, Tony Groube brought along a selection of his many mounted orchids to demonstrate the materials on which orchids can be mounted successfully....iron bark, casuarina branch, banksia wood, apricot branch, bark, cork, non-treated hardwood and even an old piece of weathered lattice. Tony's message was to give mounting an orchid a try.

Michelle McIntosh introduced many of us to water-well orchid pots and showed us an example of Coelogyne Unchained Melody grown in a water-well pot and another in an ordinary orchid pot. The difference was amazing. The Coelogyne in the water-well pot had large, plump bulbs and was thriving and it had only been in that pot since September last year. Michelle uses gravel in the bottom of the pot before the bark mix, but a straight bark mix will still allow the extra level of moisture needed. Some genera will respond well to these pots.

Ray Huddleston had a problem with his much loved hard cane Dendrobiums. In early Autumn he moved them out of a glass house into a shelter with a shade cloth cover. Exceedingly heavy rain was followed by warm weather and dark marks appeared on leaves and seemed to travel through the stems resulting in some leaves browning off. Ray sprays regularly with Phosacid, so was puzzled. There were no definitive answers from Members, but the unseasonal weather in Autumn was labelled the culprit. Let's hope that Ray can cut out the affected parts, treat the cuts with cinnamon or sulphur and halt the progress of this destructive problem.

Finally Jean Swindley showed us what to do with an overgrown Oncidium. Having retained several parts herself, Jean generously shared the many remaining pieces with Members. Grower's note on pot tag, for those who might want a bit more history than "Oncidium unknown" :

If benching at any time, the benching card should simply read **Oncidium unknown**. The benches in both sections were filled with a wonderful selection of orchids.

Peter and Laurina Vanest's return was reflected in the colourful display of beautiful Masdevallia!

The Novice Bench in particular had some quality orchids on display. Michelle McIntosh won the Open Section Plant of the Day with a beautiful example of Dendrobium bigibbum 'Miss Molly' whilst Diane and Peter Griffith's very well-flowered Paphiopedilum insigne was a deserving winner of Novice Plant of the Day.

At the next meeting.....

It will be great to see just what Bruce did to fill in his time during those lonely months.

Monthly Maintenance

*By now you should have eased off watering and fertilising your Soft Cane Dendrobiums. Wait until Spring before ramping up the watering and fertilising. From Mother's Day to Father's Day has often been used as a guideline for this. (See more detailed info. in this Newsletter)

*Natural snail deterrents include the following: sand, egg shells, gravel, wood ash, cedar chips and diatomaceous earth. Whilst these are not specifically used on orchids, trialling a circle of one of these on top of your orchid pot may be preferable to using pellets. In the case of eggshells it may even be beneficial.

*As the days cool, it is advisable to water your plants in the morning as soon as the sun starts to warm the atmosphere. On a cold day with no sun, it is probably best not to water at all.

*As buds start to emerge from flower spikes, it is a good idea to put the plant under cover or inside in a light airy room. Remember to position your plant so that it faces the same way when you move it. Use the tag as a guide.

* With your emerging Cymbidium spikes, make sure you know if they are upright, cascading or arching and train them as necessary, but again be sure not to alter the position of the pot.

Double potting......does it have a purpose?

The most obvious reason to double pot an orchid is for stability. If you choose a slightly larger black orchid pot there shouldn't be a problem. If you choose a decorative pot which doesn't have drainage holes, make sure you remove your orchid to water it.

Phalaenopsis are often sold in clear plastic pots inside a ceramic pot and obviously need to be removed for watering and then allowed to drain before replacing them back into their more attractive pot. This external pot seems to keep the medium (usually Sphagnum Moss) moist for several weeks.

Orchids such as Cymbidiums and large Dendrobiums which may be grown outdoors, can be protected from blowing over by double potting.

Double potting may be beneficial for newly deflasked seedlings and it may protect more delicate orchids from temperature extremes if you grow in a shade house without heating or cooling. Cool growers such as Masdevallia, Odontoglossum and Miltoniopsis could be double potted in Summer and warmer growers such as Hard Cane Dendrobiums, some Cattleyas, Vandas and Tolumnia may benefit from double potting in Winter.

To keep the roots cool, some growers use a terracotta external pot which they drench with water on very hot days.

Growing Soft Cane Dendrobiums.....

Love them or hate them, a Soft Cane Dendrobium in full flower is a magnificent sight. Yes, they can be straggly and display unruly growth patterns. Their leaves brown off and often canes are bare but if you follow their yearly growth pattern and needs you will be rewarded. Some years ago Tony Groube spoke to E.O.C. Members about growing Soft Cane Dendrobiums and below is a summary of what he said: GROWING PERIOD Nov.-April- Water daily. Full strength fertiliser (Low Nitrogen) once new growth is 50-70mm long. REST PERIOD May-Oct. - Water weekly, no fertiliser, full light. STAKING Early July when nodes on older canes start to swell, stake to front of plant. Remove any old leaves from last year's canes and tie the current season's fresh canes to the back of the pot. All this is easier said than done! KEIKIS Will occur if (i) roots are disturbed-repotting/root rot; (ii) if fertilised during rest period; (iii) if in too much shade.

Quick Note

The starting point at about 10ish is at Diane and David Hay's home at 2 Coila Avenue. Tea and coffee will be available here. Seedlings, Clones and Mericlones

A Seedling, as the name suggests, is grown from seed in a laboratory. As with humans, siblings will develop individual looks and characteristics, thus seedlings of the same parentage, will not necessarily, 'look alike.' Seedlings are usually produced when a grower wishes to produce a new hybrid from two quality plants. For the purposes of benching, a seedling is a whole plant, grown from seed and flowering for the first time. After the first flowering they are no longer classed as seedlings.

A Clone is an exact copy of the parent plant and can be provided by a division or a keiki. Some genera produce keikis such as Epidendrum, Phalaenopsis and Dendrobium. Keiki paste rubbed on a node can be used to help this occur if you would like an exact replica of a favourite orchid. Clones can not be benched as seedlings.

A Mericlone is an exact replica of a plant produced in a laboratory using tissue culture. It is a method used to mass produce a popular flower. Most orchids sold in shops are Mericlones. A Mericlone can not be benched as a seedling.

A recently unearthed piece of information from a talk by Neville Roper some years ago;

'Dockrillia like terracotta pots with bark.'

At the EOC Spring Show in 2015, Tom Kelly sold a number of small terracotta pots of Dockrillia striolata. At least one of them is going from strength to strength, flowering well in Spring and to date has not been repotted. Just a thought.

Blc. Malworth 'Orchidglade' FCC/ AOS

(Lc. Charlesworthii x Blc. Malvern)

This plant originated from Jones and Scully Co. back in the early 1960s. It is still considered one if not the finest yellow cattleyas ever. It can flower multiple times per year. Large flowers with a heavy substance are produced on this plant. They are very sweetly fragrant and an orange-sherbet yellow colour that is set off by a delicate pink edging surrounding the lip. Blc. Malworth was awarded an FCC/AOS by the American Orchid Society in 1969. The round full lip is variable depending on bloom season and culture.



Editor's Orchid Spotlight

This Masdevallia, belonging to Glenda and Tony Clapin, was an eye-catching addition to the Novice Section at the May meeting. Growing happily in a hollowed out stump, the flower was perfectly symmetrical and there is the promise of two more the same. Glenda has already worked out what will need to be done when it outgrows its home. The mesh from the bottom will be removed and the plant gently eased upwards. Some roots may have to be sacrificed but that may happen with plastic pots too. Whilst it would not be practical to grow all orchids this way, it certainly makes a statement and the plant is clearly thriving.


