At the last meeting......

Ron Boyd spoke to us about Multifloral Paphiopedilums, a group which require more warmth than other Paphs. Ron is a self-confessed Paphiopedilum tragic and in following his passion for these orchids he has acquired some very valuable knowledge which he generously passed on to those Members who attended the February meeting. The plant which he benched at this meeting, Paphiopedilum Saint Aeithin x sanderianum, came in a flask from Wally Rhodes 8 years ago. It very deservedly won 'Plant of the Day' in

the Popular Vote.

Ron talked about several species and showed photos of them. His challenge is to flower Paphiopedilum rothschildianum. In discussing Paphiopedilum sanderianum which grows on the limestone cliffs in Borneo and has petals up to a metre in length, Ron related the story coming from locals, that these petals will continue to grow on plants in nature until they touch something. He indicated that Paphiopedilum St. Swithin (a primary hybrid) was the easiest of the Multiflorals to flower. Ron's plants grow in a house where he used to grow Phalaenopsis. There is no heat now, but they rest on a heat bed. There are

exhaust fans moving air in and out and the concrete floor is always wet. Misters are used as well. Some practical advice from Ron based on his experiences and current practices:

Never overpot. Do not use squat pots. Ron uses medium sized Orchiata bark which has been soaked for 4 to 5 days in water with 'Wettasoil' added 2 caps to 100 litres of water. Nothing else is added to the mix. He adds 'Calciprill' (a 2-6 mm. lime granule) to the top of the pot every 2 months. Larger collections would benefit from liquid concentrate of lime using a product such as Eco-Flo-Lime. Ron currently fertilises with Pot Plant Special from Garden City Plastics. It has the appropriate NPK balance. He recommends avoiding fertilisers with urea and stresses that a very weak fertiliser mix is used. Ron fertilises every second watering. He sprays with 'Epsom Salts' once a month. 1 level teaspoon (5grams) to 10 litres of water. He also uses 'Go Go Juice' once a month as a pro-biotic

spray. Made by Neutrog, it is found in Bunnings. When re-potting, he adds 6 to 8 pellets of 'Organic Life' or 'Rooster Booster' to the mix and waters with 'Plant Starter'. If it is practical, Ron recommends yearly re-potting, though he is happy with Orchiata bark as it does not easily break down and allows him to re-pot less frequently. He uses 'Plant Starter' with seedlings. Ron uses rain water and waters when the mix is getting close to drying out. Under his conditions this could be every 4 days in Summer and every 7 to 10 days in Winter.

Thanks to Ron for sharing his knowledge and hopefully inspiring Members to try their hand at growing these spectacular orchids. His very useful advice can be applied to any orchid which grows in bark.

Members were also able to add to their Cymbidium collections with plants being sold by Ron.

At the next meeting......

Steve Morgan doesn't grow Orchids, but he does grow Bromeliads.... very well. He is coming back to share his interest with us. Steve is always happy to give advice and tips

and his entertaining presentation should not be missed. He will also have plants for sale.

Monthly Maintenance......

- If an orchid in your collection has a yellow leaf, check it out. It could be just a natural shedding of leaves due to ageing or it could be the sign of something more sinister such as root rot from over watering or broken down potting mix, the presence of mealy bug, shock after re-potting or a number of other problems. When you remove the yellowing leaf be sure to treat the area with cinnamon to prevent further fungal problems and make sure you address the cause of the yellowing if you can.
- Autumn in the Orchid House can be a very productive time especially on days that are are mild. Sarcochilus can be reported at this time as can Masdevallia and other members of the Pleurothallid group.
- It is an ideal time to examine plants individually to check on their overall health and make a note of those which need dividing or re-potting in Spring.
- Plants can be tidied up and cleaned in preparation for the colder months ahead when you might not be spending as much time in the Orchid House.
- Tags can be checked and rewritten if they have faded or the plastic has become brittle.
- Keep looking out for Cymbidium spikes to mark with a stake.

Orchid Photography Basics

The beauty of an orchid in full bloom can leave you speechless. You might think you can never capture its stunning beauty with a mere photograph unless you are a professional photographer or have a fancy camera. Think again...Although taking the perfect picture does require a bit of skill and practice on your part, it can be done. In this article we'll give you a few basic tips and tricks for getting the perfect picture of your orchids with the digital point and shoot camera that you probably already have.

- **Tip 1:** The first tip is to try and keep the camera as steady as possible. In order to get the crispest picture possible, you will need to keep the camera still in order to take the highest-quality shot. To do this successfully you might want to invest in a tripod. They allow you to easily adjust the height and angle of the camera which can result in a much better picture. If you don't want to purchase a tripod, you can easily make a stack of flat items, such as books or DVDs to set your camera on to take the pictures.
- **Tip 2:** The second tip is to beware of your background. Since you are trying to capture the beauty of your orchid, you will want the orchid to be the star of the picture and not a distracting background. Many photographers like to use a plain background such as a cloth, curtain, sheet, or tablecloth in order to focus all of the attention on the orchid itself. Generally, dark coloured orchids look best against a white or light-coloured background and lighter coloured orchids look great against a black background. If you do decide to use a plain background, be sure to place it at least two feet behind your orchid so that the auto-focus on your camera doesn't focus on tiny details in the background such as wrinkles or dust.
- **Tip 3:** The third tip is to get the perfect lighting. Lighting is a very important element in any photograph and can greatly differentiate a good photograph from a great one. The key is to diffuse a light source onto the subject you are photographing. Professional photographers use reflectors and umbrellas in order to bounce and diffuse light, although it is not necessary to buy these items. You can easily bounce sunlight off of a large white wall or sheet onto your orchid for a nice, naturally lit look. Always try to use sunlight whenever possible, because it will allow you to turn the flash off and get a more natural-looking picture without any of the odd shadows that a flash can sometimes create.
- **Tip 4:** The forth tip is to utilize the self-timer option on your camera. The self-timer greatly helps reduce the amount of movement and shakiness that occurs when you push the button. It is also a great way for you to move out of the way in case you may be producing shadows on your photography subject. Whether or not you have access to a tripod or some other stabilizing surface, try using the self-timer and compare those pictures to those taken the standard way and see which way gives you the better results.
- **Tip 5:** The fifth tip is to use your camera's macro setting. This allows you to capture a very detailed close-up shot. You may want to go through your camera's manual and find out how to best use the macro setting for your particular camera, including how far away to take the picture for the best results. The use of tripods and self-timers are very convenient when using the macro setting because even the slightest of movements can cause the picture to appear blurr. The great thing about digital photography is that you can take as many pictures as you want and are only limited to your camera's memory space.



Experiment with different angles and lighting and remember to have fun!
