At our last meeting...

It was lovely to see some Members we have not seen for many months and also good to see some new faces and new Member David Norman at his first meeting.

Flower numbers were down on the benches but there were some beautiful flowers on display. The Open Plant of the Day, *Tolu*. Private Stock x *Rrm*. Hawaian Magic, belonged to Michelle and Bruce McIntosh and in the Novice Section, Jan Boyce's *Phalaenopsis* Unknown was successful.

The Raffle Table was very well stocked. Thank you to those Members who generously contributed plants etc.

Steve Morgan added to our knowledge of Bromeliads with an informative and entertaining presentation in which he showed examples of the many and varied types of Bromeliads.

These plants grow mainly in South America from the North to the Southern most tip of Chile and Argentina. Some are also found in Florida, Texas and Central America and they can be found in every imaginable temperature range. Some are grown by collectors for their foliage and others for their flowers. In nature they grow on trees and rocks and are fertilised by falling debris.

Steve spoke about Tillandsia; one of the Bromeliad family. They are known for only growing in one spot.eg. a colony might exist on the walls of a remote canyon in Mexico and no where else in the world. These plants, with their grass like foliage, generally grow mounted. They absorb moisture through their leaves and some species are VERY slow flowering, taking up to 15 years to flower. However it is their foliage and general appearance which is most appealing. Steve's Cultivation Tips....

The mix he uses for potting is very loose and consists of perlite (20litres), pine bark (40litres), cheap potting mix (25litres) and charcoal. Drainage is vital. Don't overpot them.

They will grow in sandy soil in the garden, but if planting them in clay, leave them in the pot and put a layer of gravel into the hole before planting. Fertiliser is not vital.

Steve grows under 50% shade cloth. They need protection from frosts and in very hot weather he waters early and hopes for the best.

Grasshoppers can be a problem and Steve finds a spray with the hose to dislodge them and then dispose of them is the most effective way. He does not use chemicals if at all possible.

All Bromeliads form pups which can be removed from the main plant, as it will eventually die.

The pups of Tillandsia can be left to form a colony which can become quite spectacular over time. Thank you to Steve for sharing his extensive knowledge of these marvellous plants with us.

Space issues, when growing orchids, can be a problem. Sue Carroll will talk about how she tries to deal with this problem and will show photographs of some of her favourite compact plants and talk about their habits and peculiarities.

A Tribute to Phil Grech.....

On February 19th, 2022, Phil Grech passed away and we extend our sincere condolences to his family.

The Orchid World will be poorer for his passing. Phil's approach to orchid growing was to be admired. His Orchid House was always spotless as he was very conscious of orchid diseases. He advocated the use of organic fertilisers and fed his orchids cow and horse manure tea which was always brewed with rainwater.

He was just as meticulous in his breeding of Cymbidiums and Dendrobiums. He would trace the plant's heritage looking for a particular quality in a plant before proceeding with a cross. Some beautiful flowers were produced by Phil.

He was the originator of 21 registrations and 3 were awarded; Den. Nanny Joy, Den. Julia and Den. Finoca. All were OSCOV awards. He also was the Registrant for 51 plants. 14 were awarded and the most successful were Den. Warrigal, Cym. Radiant Ruby, Den. Sheena, Den. Lochiel and Den. Noah. His Cym. Drouin Masterpiece 'Kaleidoscope' was Orchid of Distinction Victoria 2011. He won the 2007 Regional Show with Den. Jayden Goodie which was also awarded the Gold Ira Butler Trophy 2007. He was a friend of the E.O.C. and was last in our region when he accompanied David Wain to a South Coast March Workshop several years ago. Phil will be missed by many.

Monthly Maintenance

*With the rain this year being unpredictable, abundant and probably ongoing, keep treating those orchids which are not under cover. Use products containing Phos. Acid for rot. Regular applications while this wet weather persists (and even after it stops) is probably a good idea.

La Niña is predicted to be with us until late Autumn and another could emerge by Summer according to the Forecasters.

*Use Mancozeb for fungal diseases such as black spot and rust. It works well if used regularly.

*Continue to check for Scale and Mealybug.


*By now the shade cloth that was needed in Summer should have been removed.

*Check that cold sensitive orchids are in a sheltered place ready for the Winter chill. Think about double potting those that might need warmth that you can't provide.

*As Cymbidium spikes appear, a waft of surface spray well above the spike will help to keep chewing insects away.

*Start to reduce watering and fertilising for those orchids which need a Winter rest. Be aware of those orchids which grow all year round and still need fairly regular watering.

Zygopetalum Blue Lake 'Atlantis'

This beautiful Zygopetalum with its large flowers and attractive colour and perfume belongs to Graham Jackson. It will be one of the many orchids travelling by trailer, ute and removalist van to its new home in Stuart's Point. This plant is the result of a cross between *Zygopetalum* B.G. White and *Zygopetalum crinitum*. The contrasting colours of the lip and petals (as with most Zygopetalum) makes it particularly attractive. Hopefully it will be happy in its new home.
