Before a tea and coffee break, Jean Swindley refreshed our memories about Show procedures, as it has been over two years since the E.O.C. has staged a Show.

- Plants being shown must have been owned for at least 6 months and must be free of pests and disease.
- Entry forms, which list all plants being shown, must be handed in at the beginning of the Show.
- Plant cards must show the correct name of the plant, the class in which it is being shown and the member's number.

All entries must be phoned in to Jean Swindley, Show Marshall, 0412999452, on July 4th between 10am. and 8pm.

After the break, Jean was joined by Gordon Marion to give us some tips for the safe transportation of orchids to the Show.

- Pot holders or a rubber drawer liner in a box will prevent slipping. Pack pots tightly or use old hand towels or crumpled newspaper stuffed between the pots to keep them secure.
- Hanging plants can be laid out in a shallow box with the wire hanger poked into the edge of the box or hung from your protective seat covers if you have them.
- Large plants can be placed in a hole cut out of an upturned box.
- Gordon's idea for transporting pendulous plants is excellent. Tape two pots together with their bases facing and screw the bottom pot to a piece of board.
- Finally make sure your pots are clean. If that isn't possible slip the plant inside a clean pot.
- When all plants are ready to be transported waft a spray of Surface Spray over the top of them to get rid of any bugs you
 may have missed.

For our Phalaenopsis Lovers....

Aerial Roots

Many orchids will start to grow aerial roots, which project upwards and out the sides of the pot you are growing your orchid in. This is a perfectly normal feature of epiphytic plants, which are used to growing on the surface of other plants. The roots usually have to be a bit more creative in looking for nutrients and water, so aerial roots are a consequence of this.

The air roots of an orchid are an important part of the plant and help to ensure that the plant gets the nutrition it needs. The best advice is to leave them alone. Let them spill out of the pot and do their own thing. They are often quite useful for determining whether your plant needs watered.

Hydrated air roots are green and vibrant. Dehydrated air roots are light green, grey or white and look dry and feel slightly crispy. Watering the plant will lead to an immediate colour change in the air roots.



What Should I Do With The Stem After The Orchid Has Finished Flowering?

It's really tempting to cut the stem back once the orchid has finished flowering, but this isn't a great move for the long term health of the plant. The reason is that the stem is a store of essential nutrients for the plant, like a battery, that the phalaenopsis orchid will use to sustain itself over the

next few months, while it builds the energy to flower again.

Many people feel that the best option is to cut the stem part way up, above the 3rd or 4th node. This leaves a long section of stem, and seems to encourage new growth from one of the upper nodes on the stem.

If you don't like the look of the bare stem, you can always place the orchid in a less visible location of your house. I do this with most of my orchids. I have a recovery room, that all my non-flowering orchids hang out, and then I move them to areas on display once they start flowering. Having said this, orchids usually don't enjoy sudden changes in their climates, so it you don't mind too much, you are best finding a location that your orchid loves and keeping it there, rather than moving it all round your house.
