## **Monthly Maintenance**



- The current wet and cold weather is not good for orchids. If they aren't under cover make sure you keep spraying with Phosacid. If you can get them out of the rain temporarily it might be a good idea, at least until the sun shines again.
- Try to make sure there isn't any water on leaves before a predicted cold and frosty night.
- Take special care of seedlings and young plants at this time. Putting them temporarily inside a box could help to insulate them from the cold if you can't keep them inside.
- The positive side of the occasional winter chill is that, in many cases, cool periods help induce or enhance bud initiation and flowering.
- Keep on checking your orchids for flower spikes and take measures to protect them from pests. Sarcochilus should have very obvious flower spikes by now.
- August is the time to start preparing for Spring re-potting by checking supplies of potting medium, pots and tags and making sure that pots, benches and tools are clean.
- Providing the weather is not too cold, re-potting can begin in August especially for those cool growing genera such as Masdevallias.

#### Would you like to grow Cattleyas?

Having seen the beautiful Cattleya belonging to Jean Swindley, which won Grand Champion of our Winter Show, perhaps you might like to try your hand at growing Cattleyas. Their sometimes used name 'The Queen of Orchids' is well deserved. They have long-lasting, showy flowers which come in many colours and can be very large or quite dainty and small. The plants are fairly slow-growing but long-living and are very sturdy plants.

In our region, without a heated orchid house, Cattleyas can be grown. Rentoul suggests that a minimum of 10 degrees with occasional periods of lower temperatures is ok and the Orchid Society of NSW suggests a range of 7 to 32 degrees will suit Cattleya. They appreciate a temperature drop in the evening. It is advised that the potting medium should be open and free draining. Most sources agree that regular watering in the growing season from Spring to Summer is recommended with far less water in Winter. The plants should dry out in between watering and never be allowed to have wet feet for extended periods of



Cattleyas like bright, indirect light and morning sun is the best for them. Their foliage is the best guide. Dark green leaves probably means not enough light, while yellowing leaves means too much light. The right amount of light is essential for good flowering.

A good air flow will help to keep diseases away, but regular checking for pests is advisable. Minimal but regular feeding is recommended from Spring to Autumn.

Removal of dead sheaths for cultivated plants is highly recommended. This would occur in nature without human intervention. If you decide to buy Cattleya from one of the many Orchid Nurseries that sell them, it is a good idea to have a chat to the

owners to see which are suitable for your area and conditions.



time. Morning watering is also recommended.

# Editor's Orchid Spotlight

This delightful small plant won Champion Laelinea at the Batemans Bay Winter Show.

It belongs to Jean Swindley and she describes it as 'easy to grow'. It is indigenous to Brazil and grows well in our climate given good air flow, medium to bright indirect light and cool to intermediate temperatures.

Whilst Jean's plant is grown in a pot, it can also be grown mounted.

## **Our Spring Show**

If you have plants outside that are about to flower, then you may like to bring then under cover to avoid any spots caused by rain. Spikes can be staked and plants and leaves can be cleaned.

## between 10am and 8pm to register your plants.

Show Set up on Friday, 26th August will commence at 2pm. Members are needed to assist with this .

At 3pm. benching may begin if the Show Marshall indicates that the tables are ready.

## Benching should be finished by 5pm. so that judging can commence.

Once your plant has been benched and displayed to your satisfaction, with its best side facing the front and its tag indicating that position, you are asked not to touch your plant (or any other plants) until the Show is over.

If you are showing for the first time, please don't be concerned. Ask anyone and they will be happy to assist you.

Helpers will be needed during the Show and especially with the packing up on Sunday from 2pm.

## Please do not water your plants for several days before the Show.

Also, if anyone has flowers or foliage suitable for making posies, please bring that along as well.

Every little bit helps.

## Let's all pitch in to make this another really great Show.
