At the next meeting....

September 9th. Doors open at 1.00pm. Plants to be benched by1.30pm. Meeting commences at 2pm. Guest Speaker: Rob Fish

Rob and Sue Fish are successful growers of several different genera of orchids but none more so than Phalaenopsis. At the next meeting Rob will be talking to us about how they grow their Phalaenopsis and will hopefully have some tips for those of us who love them and try to grow them. The very good news is that they will have some baby Phalaenopsis for sale.

They will also be selling some Dendrobium Delicatum 'Lorelai' plants. These have their origins with Sue and Rob's awarded plant from the 2019 Moruya Orchid Spectacular .If you attended this wonderful event you would have seen this enormous Dendrobium which was transported in its own trailer to the Show.

I don't think we will be seeing the 'parent' plant on display again so take advantage of its offspring!

Odontoglossum Culture.

Brian Phelan began growing this genera as a Novice which is a fairly brave step to take given the reputation of Odontoglossum as being difficult to grow and 'fussy'. Brian was successful and has continued to grow these beautiful plants in a far more sophisticated manner. His glasshouse is equipped with an evaporative cooler to ease the effect of dry warm winds, fans to circulate air, foggers to keep up the humidity and a heater in one end which provides the warmth needed for Miltoniopsis which he grows in the same house. It drops to a minimum of 10 degrees. However Brian stresses that Odontoglossum can be grown in a bush house with a hard roof providing certain conditions are met.

They like indirect light and will grow successfully with Masdevallia, Paphiopedilum and Phalaenopsis.

Cool Summer temperatures are necessary, as is a hard roof to give control over watering.

Brian grows in Sphagnum Moss and Perlite...2/3 Sphagnum to 1/3 Perlite.

Plants should not be over potted and they should be reported each year with just enough room for a year's growth. Medium should be kept moist at all times but never soggy. There is a short dormant period after flowering and the medium can be allowed to dry out a little more at this time but not completely.

Brian grows in transparent pots so that he can monitor root growth and moisture content. This pot is then slipped inside an opaque pot.

Peter's Excel is used at every watering (1 teaspoon in a bucket of water) with a once a month watering with plain water. This is another reason for repotting every year, as there will be a build up of salts.

They can flower all year round but their peak flowering time is late Winter to Spring.

Some tips from Brian:

Don't let your plant flower in Summer. Remove the spike.

Don't leave flowering spikes on the plant for too long.

Repot in Autumn or Spring.

Remove all leafless bulbs before repotting.

If bulbs start to show signs of shrivelling, cut off flower spike.

Check plants individually to assess watering needs.

First Aid for a sick plant.....take out of the pot and remove all dodgy roots. If there are no roots, trim back the leaves by 2/3. Put plants into moist Sphagnum, stake them and wait.

To prepare Sphagnum Moss from a dried bale, pull off the amount needed, tease it apart, place in a plastic container and spray with water in a mister turning constantly until it is damp. Then chop into short sections and mix with Perlite.

Only prepare as much Sphagnum as you will use in a short period of time.

Some members were able to purchase some of Brian and Lynn's orchids to add to their collection. Hopefully we will see them in flower on the bench at a meeting next year.

We want to thank Lynn and Brian for making the trip to Moruya and for sharing their knowledge with us.

Monthly Maintenance

- September is a busy month with the repotting of orchids being a priority. If you are using bark as your potting
 medium make sure it is damp. The temptation to add bits and pieces to your bark is always there, but bear in
 mind Ron Boyd's advice to keep it simple and just use bark. The addition of organic life pellets or some slow
 release fertiliser may be of benefit when repotting and a final drink of Seasol should be beneficial.
 Once repotted, set your plants aside in a cool place for several weeks before returning them to their spot.
- For those orchids grown in Sphagnum, the advice given by Brian Phelan about the preparation of Sphagnum Moss applies to all orchids grown this way.
- The warmer weather in September will encourage pests and bugs to emerge so watch out and be aware and if
 necessary treat your plants. Have EcoOil on hand and something stronger such as Conguard if you spot an
 outbreak.
- It is time to return to the Spring regime of watering and fertilising. Just watch out for those occasional nights of low temperatures and make sure your watering and fertilising is done before noon at this stage in the year.
- Dendrobium beetles will be appearing soon. The damage they cause will be apparent on your plant for years so
 don't let them into your collection. If your orchid house can be completely sealed this is a great deterrent. If not
 check late in the day for adult beetles and spray them or knock them into a container of water.
 Preventative sprays such as Carbaryl can be used for adult beetles but it is vital that they be caught before they
 lay eggs, so start your campaign early.

This plant had its origins in the Eric Young Orchid Foundation in Jersey in the Channel Islands and received an Award of Merit from the Royal Horticultural Society.



This much nicer photo of Oda. Star of Jersey comes from the Mt. Beenak Facebook site. Clive Halls is one of the few orchid nurserymen in Australia who sell Odontoglossum and he is winding down to retirement very soon. The chances of adding any of the Odontoglossum family to your collection within Australia is becoming slimmer and slimmer.
